Unity Organises Cyberbullying Workshop

Unity College, in collaboration with Times NIE and CECS, organised an enlightening workshop on cyberbullying and social media distraction for students of classes XI and XII, intending to foster support and awareness of the hidden online threat. The session was conducted by Vishesh Singh, a distinguished consultant in the field. Singh began the workshop by engaging the students with the thought-provoking question, "Who knows your potential best?" The

Singh placed significant emphasis on the importance of managing and controlling one's engagement on social media platforms. He shared several links highlighting potential cyber-attack risks, equipping students with the knowledge to navigate the virtual world more securely.
